Chapter VI

In this chapter an assessment of socio-economic condition of ex-tea tribe community is attempted. The importance of the ex tea tribe and tea tribe community in the Kaziranga National Park area lies in the fact that this community whether in tea industry as labour or outside constitutes a major chunk of population in the area and a reflection on their lifestyle gives the impression as to how they make their both ends meet especially those who are not in the regular services of tea garden surrounding the KNP. Shri Himanga Gogoi made the research based on empirical evidences in a village named KOHORA 2 with 100% ex-tea tribe people.

Assessment of socio-economic status of ex-tea tribe community

Overview

The ex-tea tribe community of the region has an immense contribution towards the local social and economic activity. Their history, social and material culture has been discussed in the previous chapters. This chapter shall focus on the economic condition of the ex-tea tribe community. To assess the economic condition and development of the community a household census was conducted. 2 No. kohora-A village predominantly inhabited by ex-tea tribe community was taken as a sample for the assessment. Various parameters were taken to assess the situation.


Village Studied: 2 No. kohora

The village is located on the fringe area of kaziranga National Park. It is about an hour (by road) from Bokakhat-a sub division of Golaghat district of Assam. The village is predominantly inhabited by people belonging to the ex-tea tribe community; a minority population of gorkha community also co-exist. Baptism is followed by all the community members of the ex-tea tribe. Hinduism is followed by the gorkha community. The village is primarily agrarian. Floods and wild animals from the national park frequently destroy crops and residents of the inhabitants. There is a lack of road infrastructure in the village. There is no public health centre or hospital. The village lacks proper irrigation facilities. There are two anganwadi centres and one high school.

Sex ratio:

The male to female sex ratio is an important indicator of gender composition in the population. The ideal male to female ratio is 1:1. 2No. kohora has a ratio of 19:17 which is almost equivalent to the ideal levels. Hence the village displays a balanced gender population.


Type of House/residence:



Literacy:


Literacy can be described as the ability of an individual above the age of 6 to read, write and understand in any language. Literacy is an important yardstick to measure development. It ensures that information conveyed in any form can be understood by the individual concerned. The graph below shows the literacy trends in the village. There is a sharp contrast in the levels of literacy between the male and female population. There are 142 literate men in comparison to 113 literate women. This reflects the gender bias in literacy of the region where the male population id given preference in literacy.

A vast majority of the village still rely on traditional methods and materials of house construction. This can be attributed to easy availability of local resources as well as lack of finance to build a concrete house. Moreover frequent floods discourage construction of pucca or concrete houses. 69 households have kuccha or mud houses. 2 households reside in a semi kuccha or partial mud house whereas 1 household has a pucca house.




Sanitation

Sanitation is a vital component for overall health and hygiene in the region. Sanitation curbs the problem of open defecation thereby containing spread of many communicable diseases. The graph below shows the sanitation levels in the village. A fairly large number of household have sanitation facility. During the survey all households seem to have some form of sanitation ranging from pucca to kuccha sanitation facilities. 27 households still practise open defecation. To make full sanitation feasible more awareness is necessary.




Electricity:



In modern times, consumption and accessibility of electricity is taken as a yardstick of development. Electricity is essential to provide lighting, cooling and heating to households. Power is essential to drive the modern economy. The graph below shows the accessibility of electricity to the households. A vast majority of the village has not been electrified. 41 households have no access to electricity due to unaffordable bills. In some areas of the village there is a lack of proper electric infrastructure.


Financial inclusion:

Financial inclusion can be described as the accessibility to affordable financial services, especially for the poor and disadvantaged groups. Financial inclusion in true sense can occur only when the individual is connected to the organized financial sector through bank accounts as opposed to the unorganized sector. The village is divided right in the middle over access to bank accounts. 34 households have at least one bank account whereas 38 households do not. To achieve full financial inclusion local villagers and banks must collaborate to spread financial literacy as well as facilitate opening of bank accounts under various schemes.



Government schemes availed:


The welfare state implements various schemes for the upliftment of the downtrodden and the disadvantaged groups in the society. Below is a graph depicting the accessibility of various schemes by the households of the village.



MGNREGA or Mahatma Gandhi national employment guarantee act is the most outreached scheme in the village, followed by BPL ration cards, APL ration cards, Indira awasyojana and swatch bharat toilets. Every household in the village has been covered by at least one scheme except for 17 households who have availed no government scheme.

Prevalence of diseases:


The village has a series of prevalent diseases that has been occurring frequently over the past one year. The graph below shows the same-



The graph above clearly displays that a vast majority of the village is healthy and free from disease. Hypertension is the most prevalent disease affecting 10 households. Diarrhoea and gall bladder problem is the least prevalent disease affecting only 1 household each. Overall the village displays healthy environment.

Livelihood source:

Livelihood is the way a person earns his/her daily income or means of basic survival. The graph below displays the livelihood pattern of the village-



Majority of the household provide their labour on a daily basis as a livelihood means. Agriculture (seasonal) and fishing is the next most popular livelihood option. Due to lack of land resources and frequent destruction of crops by wild animals, full time agriculture is less prevalent in the village. A few well-to-do households have managed to set up their own business such as local shops or other enterprise. Some have even succeeded to find govt. as well as private services in the nearby areas.

Tourism as source of livelihood:

Tourism industry is a major boon for the villagers of Kohora2. The star category resorts viz. Borgoss and lora in the vicinity provide livelihood options in form of regular and seasonal employment in cleaning, house keeping, and such other auxiliary services for both girls & boys, women & men staying at their own homes. These semi skilled workers in the resorts earn from 3000 to 4000 on a monthly basis and are quite content with the earning to support their families. This was evident as our attempts to motivate educated youth to take up occupations in cutting & tailoring (for girls) and electrical wiring & motor mechanic (for boys) with placement opportunities at a higher wage outside the district or state through Employment Generation Mission of State Government did not meet with success.

Religious Practices:

The Kohora 2 village consists of some families (around 30%) who practice Christianity by faith. There is a Baptist Church in the village. Others profess Hinduism and are mostly fun loving people enjoying all major traditional festivals with pomp and gaiety.

Conclusion:

2 No. kohora displays a backward socio-economic environment. Agriculture related allied activities occupy the main source of livelihood and more than 50 p.c of the households do not have adequate crop land to support their livelihood. From the following household data which reflect the economic and social conditions of the villagers of Kohora 2, it is easily understood that almost all the families live a very subsistence level of lifestyle, just earning enough to meet the both ends meet. Their assets are the bare minimum a poor family owns in a typical Assamese village. As regards the ownership of crop lands these villagers are mostly agricultural labourers that too seasonal. Only a few of the households have their farm lands to support their needs. Every year their agricultural fields get inundated by recurring floods and crops get lost/damaged in the process. Only a few families have members in govt. employment (mostly of Gr.IV. category). Interestingly some of the families of the village have country boats which are being considered essential during floods. Average income of the households annually may be put at Rs.70,000.00 to Rs.1,30,000.00 only. Welfare schemes of the government are very supportive to their livelihood. The village is in the fringe of KNP and perhaps some areas are parts of the park.

However, few indicators like road infrastructure, power infrastructure, sustainable livelihood etc are a matter of concern. The village scores moderately in matters of gender ratio, literacy and sanitation. Health indicators are also not that bad. In case the infrastructural as well as livelihood criteria are raised, this village can improve its socio economic status in the area.
